

### **Synopsis:**

Duke Vincentio of Vienna leaves the town on "special business," giving the puritanical Lord Angelo his power while he's gone. Angelo quickly condemns a man named Claudio to death for premarital relations with his soon to be wife, and tells Claudio's virtuous sister, Isabella, that the only way to save Claudio's life is by sleeping with the corrupt lord. Unbeknownst to all, Duke Vincentio is still in town, disguised as a friar and watching the story unfold, attempting to help the people of Vienna without revealing his true identity.



#### **Director's Note**

The show you are about to watch is a question without an answer: how do we make a just society, and what part should religion—specifically Christianity—play in that society? When you believe in heaven and hell, the stakes are greater than life and death, the consequences eternally permanent. But when your religious obligation includes a moral injunction to forgive each other's sins, how can you uphold laws and hold people accountable for perpetrating genuine harm? And how can we trust our institutions of Church and State to handle those problems when they exploit the power and trust invested in them to manipulate and violate those in their care?

I chose to set our productions in 1980s America for a variety of reasons. The 80s are past enough to convey that the societal ailments of Shakespeare's Vienna are not new, yet modern enough to convey that these ailments still plague us. The Reagan Era saw the rise of the "religious right" and the cultural and political backlash against the sexual (and women's, and racial) liberty movement(s) of the 1960s and 70s. While the 80s didn't see the same literal morality laws as Shakespeare's Vienna, religious morality was still reflected in policy: the villanization and neglect of AIDS victims; abstinence only sex education programs that worsened the problems they sought to correct; and expansions to the "war on crime" that destroyed communities of color and largely failed to meaningfully improve society. If we're going to ask the question of this play and search for an answer, we might as well do it to the soundtrack of Bonnie Tyler and George Michael.

Shakespeare doesn't give an answer. I don't have one either. All I have is what Isabella has at the end of this show: a knowledge that the heart of the Gospel is radical forgiveness, a forgiveness so extravagant and unfair that it could not possibly be codified, but is somehow still our only hope for healing. "Why all the souls that were forfeit once, and He that might the vantage best have took found out the remedy. How would you be if He which is the top of judgment should but judge you as you are? O, think on that, and mercy then will breathe within your lips like man new-made!"

I would like to thank Kat, Paige, and the entire staff of Washington Hall for your continued support of NSR; Scott Jackson for his mentorship as our club's advisor; my wonderful wonderful tech crew for making this show so stunningly beautiful; my beautiful and talented cast for pouring your time, diligence, and love into every rehearsal; my fantastic tech director Cate Cappelmann for making all my weird ideas come to life; my lovely, extraordinary stage manager Komal "Kay" Wani for making pretty much everything about this show happen (I love you); and my stunning, incredible, genius assistant director Natalie Allton for being my right hand, second head, and bedrock of sanity through this entire process. #### **About the Cast and Crew**

It is considered one of the worst films of all time and was a box-office bomb, grossing \$75 million on a budget of \$80–100 million. It is estimated to have lost Universal Pictures between \$71 million and \$114 million after marketing and distribution costs.
