Plot Summary

Much Ado About Nothing

Cats and Dogs. Oil and Water. Jon Snow and Knowledge. Some things just don't go together. Beatrice and Benedick are one of such things. Renowned throughout all of Messina for their great wit and even greater disdain for one another, the two arch rivals are reunited for a weekend for a massive celebration. Through an elaborate series of hoodwinks, flimflams, shenanigans, bamboozles, and hornswoggles by their tricksy friends, Beatrice and Benedick are forced to confront their true feelings for one another.

Romeo and Juliet

Opening the morning before a long-awaited party, Lady Capulet calls her daughter forth to inform her that her marriage to the Count Paris is being arranged. Juliet is less than enthused, and her aversion to this marriage is only heightened by meeting a dreamy new boy at the party. Facilitated by Juliet's beloved nurse, young love takes its course and Romeo and Juliet are married before they know it. However, events take a turn for the worse as Romeo gets tangled up with Juliet's cousin Tybalt, Tybalt up and dies, and Romeo finds himself banished. Juliet is left married to a secret love that has fled to far away Mantua. With her marriage with Paris still impending, Juliet looks to be out of options unless her nurse somehow saves the day. Will Romeo and Juliet ever make it to their happily ever after?

<u>Twelfth Night</u>

Off the coast of Illyria, a storm has caused a terrible shipwreck. Viola, assuming that her twin brother Sebastian has been drowned in the wreck, disguises herself as a man and takes on the name of Cesario to protect herself. Viola, disguised as the male Cesario, goes to work with Duke Orsino, but finds herself quickly falling in love him. Things get more complicated when Orsino asks 'Cesario' to woo Olivia, the lady he loves, for him, and Olivia falls in love with 'Cesario!' Meanwhile, Sebastian, who believes that his sister has died, has finally arrived in Illyria. With lost siblings, mistaken identities, and endless courting matches, Violas journey for her happy ending is bound to be...complicated.
